

PLANS FOR ANTIC CHURCH APPROVED

Presbyterians to Build On Rock and Walnut Streets Lot Recently Bought By Dr. Martin's Congregation.

The congregation of the United Presbyterian church, at a meeting last night, unanimously approved plans for a new church to be built on a lot recently acquired at the northwest corner of Rock and Walnut streets. The building committee was authorized to start construction of the main building at once. Provision was made to build the parish house at a later date.

Franklin R. Hinde of Providence is architect of the building, which will be of stone, in pure Gothic style. It will be approximately 125 feet long by 55 feet wide. The main auditorium will seat 500 and the parish house will be in the basement of the main building for the Sunday school and Guild until the parish house is built. The parish house will be made in every respect with every accommodation for the social activities of the congregation.

Construction of the church will be begun as soon as the bids have been passed upon by the committee which has announced its intention of giving preference to local contractors so far as possible. It is hoped to have the building ready for occupancy by Sept. 1, 1925.

Members of the finance committee are R. E. Loper, chairman; Mrs. Frank B. Lindsay, Miss Janet McWilliam, Mrs. Peter Stirling and George McWilliam.

On the building committee are Joseph F. Hinde, chairman; Mrs. David C. Morrison, Dr. C. M. Parille, James McKelvie and Gilbert P. Van Blarcom, clerk of committee.

The United Presbyterian church has been in its present home at Pearl and Anawan streets for 75 years. Dr. William J. Martin, the present pastor, has served the congregation for nearly 10 years.

igation of voluminous papers, which I cannot personally make, and so I should be compelled to follow the usual practice in such cases and rely upon your advice as attorney general and head of the Department of Justice.

Personal Interest Involved.

"But you will see at once that the committee is investigating your personal conduct and hence you have become an interested party—and the committee wants these papers because of your advice as attorney general and head of the Department of Justice. Assuming that the request of the committee is appropriately limited to investigation of the conduct of the person who is the subject of the inquiry, the question will always be the same. In view of the fact that the inquiry relates to your personal conduct you are not in a position to give to me or the committee what would be disinterested advice as to the public interest. You have a personal interest in this investigation which is being made of the conduct of yourself and your office, which may be in conflict with your official interest as the attorney general. I am not sure that your fairness or integrity, I am merely reciting the facts, that you are placed in two positions, one your personal interest, and the other your office of attorney general, which may be in conflict. How can I satisfy a request for action in matters of this nature on the ground, you, as attorney general, advise against it, when you as the individual against whom the inquiry is directed, necessarily have a personal interest in it? I do not see how you can be acting for yourself in your own defense in this matter, and at the same time and on the same question acting as my adviser as attorney general.

"These two positions are incompatible and cannot be reconciled. I am sure you will see that it is necessary for me to have the advice of a disinterested attorney general, in order that I may discharge the duties of my office in this and other matters. I feel certain that you will know how to act in this situation. It has arisen. It only illustrates the difficulties which are certain to recur with ever increasing embarrassment and your inability to perform satisfactorily.

CASES HEARD IN WATER DISTRICT COURT HAS MEETING

No Action Taken--No Disturbers Present, Says Chairman Monks, and Harmony Prevailed.

The Committee on Water Works held its second meeting of the year last night, conferring with officials of the Water department, including members of the Water board, for the purpose of securing information about the matter of extension of mains, elimination of dead ends, water pressure, etc. Incidentally, the matter of rates was discussed. No action of any kind was taken by the committee.

Aside from the report of the meeting, which was given out by Clerk of Committees Dwyer, Alderman Monks who is chairman of the committee, the committee had no business to discuss. The report, which had been given by the clerk, remarked that "there were no disturbers present and the meeting was a harmonious one."

Those present at the meeting included four members of the committee, Aldermen Monks, Clifton, Woolley and Hutchinson; Albert Brunelle and Charles B. Chace, members of the Watuppa Water board; Supt. John W. Moran and Mayor Talbot did not appear, nor did Commissioner Joseph P. Phelan. Alderman Marchand, the Democratic member of the committee, was absent. So that, all in all, it was a sort of a love feast.

In opening the meeting, Alderman Monks said that it had not been the practice in years past for the Committee on Water Works to hold many meetings. In fact, he said that he could remember the last meeting since he has been in the city government, until this year, when he assumed the chairmanship. He thought it was a good idea, nevertheless, to hold such meetings with Water department officials in order that the committee might be kept in touch with the work which is going on. He disclaimed any idea of wanting to usurp authority and powers of the Water board as he was fully aware of the right of the board. He could see no harm in securing information and making suggestions, inasmuch as the city government is directly responsible to the voters.

In answer to questions which were put to him by various members of the committee, Supt. Moran said that last year 12,835 feet of new pipe, varying from eight to 12 inches, had been laid. He said that some dead ends in the Maplewood section had been eliminated and the service and pressure improved thereby. Some of the work had been done in the New Boston section, particularly in the vicinity of the Spencer Borden school. In all, he said 21 dead ends had been eliminated. The work of

Charles Wood, 121 Star street, was arrested by members of the liquor squad yesterday afternoon on charges of violating the liquor laws. The officers said that they found in stills and four gallons of liquor, but Charles pleaded not guilty. His case was continued for one week.

George Lombardi, 95 Cherry street, a second offender against the drunkenness law, was fined \$5. Antonio S. Oliveira, 61 Orswell street, and Harry G. Gault, 878 Grafton street, were each sentenced to 30 days each in the House of Correction. Officer Lafayette, 166 Spring street, was fined \$5 for being a nuisance officer for four months. Three others, first offenders, were released without appearances in court.

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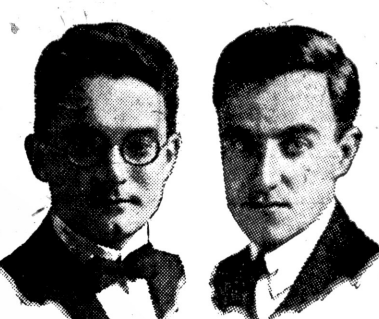
